Dear Parishioners

Modern scientists with their great ability to reason and compute can easily pinpoint most of our problems, but the trouble is that they can't solve many of them. How can they solve them relying only on human wisdom? Indeed, we need human wisdom. It is wise to act wise unless you are otherwise. But don't we know that human wisdom often degenerates into brute reason, which is worse than brute force, and in the process of acquiring it many people make fools of themselves? Besides, human pride and ambition often parade under the guise of human wisdom and, as a result, some foolishly identify even war and violence with courage, though none of us can be sure of our courage until the day of our death. Hence, instead of relying on earthly wisdom, we must look up to the "wisdom that comes from above" which alone can show the way to equality in economics, decency in politics, prosperity in society and peace among all men, the deep, deep peace of the heart. Christ himself spelt out this way when he told his disciples who were arguing among themselves, "Who is the most important?" that, "If anyone wishes to rank first, he must remain the last one of all and the servant of all." This means that the way to the peace of Christ is first humility. Humility is not bowing my head so low that I can see nothing but my navel. Rather it is acknowledging one's human limitation and depending upon divine providence. However, the person who often looks up to God rarely looks down on any neighbour and hence a humble person will naturally respect and care for fellow human beings. A humble person sees their own brother and sister in the eyes of any man or woman offering loving service to all, especially to the weak and the poor. These days, the price of everything is rising. The cost of peace also can be high. Christ's refusal to take up the sword, and his loving service to sinful humanity led him to his passion and death. But then he rose to glory with an explosion of joy and life. Likewise, if we dedicate ourselves to loving service, even at a great cost, the risen light and the peace of Christ will fill the earth.
