Dear Parishioners

One major effect of the commercialisation of Christmas is that every year the celebration of Christmas seems to get earlier and earlier. It is common now to hear Christmas carols in early December, by this time many people have not only bought but have also decorated their trees. Virtually the only place where one does not see Christmas cribs and hear Christmas carols is in church (a fact that must cause some confusion in the minds of young children). While secular society is frantically anticipating the feast and adapting it for its own purposes, the church obstinately says, "not yet."

In spite of the difficulty of being out of step with the surrounding society, the church considers it important to celebrate not only the birth of Christ, but also the *waiting* for the birth of Christ. Advent is meant to put us spiritually in touch with the longing for salvation, particularly of the Jewish people, that finds its fulfilment in Jesus.

The fulfilment of the Jewish anticipations of salvation took place in Jesus in an unforeseen way, a way that challenged the expectations themselves, and was therefore unrecognisable or unacceptable to many. This reminds us that even we who live after Jesus' life and message are celebrating and awaiting something that we cannot totally define or comprehend. We also have different visions of the Christ and the salvation he represents. What does Jesus mean to us? Is He a legislator and teacher of morality? A miracle worker and giver of gifts? A mystical priest? What do we hope for from God? Protection and defence for our lives? Good fortune and prosperity? A heavenly reward in the hereafter?
