First reading: Isaiah 2:1-5

Response to the Psalm: I rejoiced when I heard them say: 'Let us go to God's

house.'

Second reading: Romans 13:11-14

Gospel Acclamation: Alleluia, alleluia! Let us see, O Lord, your mercy and

give us your saving help. Alleluia!

Gospel: Matthew 24:37-44

The special Gospel during the coming liturgical year, of which today's is the first day, is St. Matthew. In today's passage Jesus is replying to the Apostles' insecurity. Without their understanding what he was talking about, he referred to his Second Coming. Throughout Advent, our liturgy will refer frequently to that word "coming." The very word "Advent" means "coming." Jesus' comings are in history, mystery and majesty.

Historically, though Advent is a time of waiting for Jesus' coming it's not a time of make-believe. We don't pretend that Jesus hasn't already been born of Mary, preached a public life, dies and rose. In mystery, we recognise Jesus' presence among us in his Spirit, his Word, his Sacraments and one another. We also await his final coming among us at our death and in majesty in the last days of creation. No matter which coming we refer to — Christmas, or any time during the days of our lives, or at our death, or at the end of the world — Jesus' message is that, rather than knowing the exact details of time, it's more important we be always vigilant and prepared.

That's where Isaiah, who provides today's first reading, comes in. Isaiah – and all the prophets – were much more concerned with *shaping* the future than *foretelling* it. They were courageous witnesses to God, even in the face of imprisonment and death. Isaiah, because he looked forward with joy to the coming of Jesus, has a prominent place in the liturgies of Advent and Christmas.

So, as we begin our preparations for the coming of Jesus, let's widen our sometimes narrow band of vision sort out our priorities and, with Jesus' help, shape our future in the right way.
