Gospel: John 2:13-25

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In the Western world, many people are litigious. In the United States for example there's one lawyer for every 600 people, compared to Japan, where there's one lawyer for 12,000 people and where people prefer other methods like family compromise to settle disputes. But all associations of people need laws: for recourse, to bind people together, and to put into words and action what the group sees as not only putting forth their wisdom and their priorities, but also showing a certain spirit.

That's what the Ten Commandments did, but, over time, like all people everywhere certain Jews distorted elements in order to benefit personally. That's how The Temple was being desecrated. It's no wonder that Jesus swung into action, this desecration was worse than people who talk to loudly in our churches, or unresponsive welcoming groups, or irreverential ministers of communion. For Jesus, the whole business was degrading to true religion.

Jesus' enemies quietly asked him for a sign of his authority. The fact that they asked showed that they understood the deeper meaning of what was going on: Jesus had laid claim to an authority greater than the Temple and the religious officials charged with its functioning. Jesus would neither trust himself to the people, because he knew what they were thinking, he knew them all. He knew that to many of them he was a wonder worker, or magician. If he spoke to them of service, or sacrifice, or surrender to God's will, they wouldn't have understood.

Those attitudes haven't essentially changed. Even today, many prefer to believe in the kind of Jesus *they choose*, instead of looking at the Jesus *God sent*. Most of us are attached to old habits, but God doesn't work in our ways, but according to His own will, and that includes the mysterious message of the cross. The cross is a sign (though not a miraculous spectacle) and a wisdom Ithough considered foolishness by the world). To understand all of that leads to living not only in the letter of God's law but, more importantly, in its spirit, which is love, and in an awareness of the presence of God, which gives an entirely new orientation to law.
