. Dear Parishioners

In the readings we see Jesus Christ, true God and true man, grappling with the limitations of his own humanity and that of others. He preaches in his hometown but does not succeed in convincing those whom he probably knew from when he was a boy. We are told: "And he could do no mighty work there, except that he laid his hands upon a few sick people and healed them." This may mean that Jesus, shocked and disappointed, felt that a miracle would not be worthwhile because of

their degree of unbelief, but did not wish the sick to suffer because of what was lacking in others.

For Christians, to be mindful that we are limited creatures is not to put ourselves down but is meant to be a source of comfort. In a world where profit and loss, efficiency and productivity, dominate, there is something truly wonderful in knowing that our relationship with God does not work like this. God has made us as we are. He did not make us super-efficient religious beings that can work wonders at every turn, who always succeed; or beings whose hearts are always turned towards him. Why God created us as we are is a profound mystery, but a mystery that involves sin and our redemption and transformation in Christ.

All this is therefore not meant to be understood as an excuse for resting in mediocrity or worse. It is an invitation to be realistic about what we can achieve and what we can't, without losing heart. It is an invitation to reflect on our need for God, and what we are called to be in Christ. It is also an invitation to be creative and imaginative in working within the limits of what it is to be a human being. After all, God created us as human beings. He loves us as human beings, even to the point of becoming one.
